Tractor Mirror Catching on Fast

"It's going great," reports Jerome Klinger, inventor and manufacturer of Culti-vision, a large tractormounted mirror that gives the driver "rear vision" without having to turn his head.

"We've sold over 2,000 units in 16 different states and expect to move a lot more in the weeks ahead," he told FARM SHOW two weeks ago.

Culti-vision has caught on fastest with owners of rear-mounted row crop cultivators. They're also popular with sugar beet growers who use them in conjunction with beet lifters to help the tractor driver keep the lifter exactly on the row so it doesn't veer off and damage beets.

Culti-vision comes with brackets for easy mounting on most makes of tractors. It's compatible with all factory-made cabs, both in terms of mounting room and the driver being able to view the mirror from inside the cab. Standard models are made for mounting on the right side of the tractor viewed from the driver's seat. "We offer left-hand units on special order for the farmer whose tractor has a battery or other obstruction in the way for right-hand mounting, for the farmer who wants a unit on each side, or the farmer who's left-handed and prefers having a single unit on his left rather than right side," Klingler points out

"Just about anybody can cultivate and do a good job with Culti-vision," says Klingler. "Last year, a corn farmer whose herbicide application didn't work recruited his wife and son to drive rear-mounted cultivators. Neither had cultivated before and they were having trouble getting the hang of it until he installed Culti-vision units on both rigs. They got along fine when they could look forward into the mirror to see what was going on behind their backs."


The mirror measures 9 in. wide and 15 in. long. Dust settling on the mirror hasn't been a problem, says Klingler. "You get about as much dust as there is on a tractor windshield. You seldom have to wipe the mirror but, if you do, it's easily done with a rag and a squirt or two of window cleaner."

Retail cost of Culti-vision, which comes painted black for good compatibility with all tractor colors, is \$65. Major U.S. distributor is Fleischer Manufacturing-Distributing, Columbus, Neb. 68601 (ph. 402 564-3244).

45 FT. UNIT FOLDS TO 15 FT. FOR TRANSPORT

Toolbar Applicator Folds backwards



In transport position, rearfolded toolbar applicator is lower than height of the tractor. The 45 ft. wide unit folds to narrow, 15 ft. width.

You just pull two pins and drive the tractor forward to fold DMI's new inline-folding tool bar anhydrous ammonia applicator for transport. Available in 45 ft. and larger widths, it folds backwards to a narrow 15 ft. for down-the-road transport.

To return to field position, simply pull the same two pins and back the tractor. The wings unfold and lock into position.

Spring-loaded mounting brackets provide positive vertical release when working in rocky soil. Clamps keep the 1 by 2 in. shanks firmly attached to the beam with no side-slip or lateral movement. The unit is equipped with double high capacity regulators for full flow of ammonia; 2 distributors for even application; 12.5 by 15 high flotation tires; six bolt hub on 2 1/8 in. spindles to withstand stress; and a long tongue to accommodate sharp turns with extra wide dualed tractors.
