**Baling Behind A Forage Harvester**

The story in our last issue about the combine-pulled baler Deere plans to introduce at the Farm Progress Show this fall prompted a call from a reader who thinks he has a better idea.

Harry Wallace says mounting a baler on back of a forage harvester instead of a combine makes more sense because they generate so much more crop material at a much faster rate than a combine. And you could bale up high-quality chopped forage by wrapping as silage bales. His idea is to mount a baler directly to the back of a forage harvester and blow "earlage" or haylage directly into the bale chamber.

"So far as I can find, no one has done this before in North America but I found a video on YouTube.com of a Claas Jaguar 870 with a trailing Claas Quadrant big square baler kicking out wrapped silage bales. This summer I started my 38th year writing about farm inventions and ideas here at FARM SHOW. She actually appeared in the magazine back in 2001, at the age of 9, when she invented the "Magic Mitt" for an Inventor's Fair (Vol. 25, No. 2). It was a knit glove fitted with patches of Velcro to hold disposable electrostatic dust cloths for cleaning mini blinds. What made the story newsworthy - other than the fact that she was my daughter - was the fact that a representative from a big manufacturer took pics of her idea and later submitted it to the company's product development people. The Magic Mitt never made it to market (the company came out with a similar product soon after) but it was an exciting event for our family.

Fast forward to 2014. Allie and I were recently on vacation, taking a walk through a small northern Minnesota town. She said, "Hey Dad. Take a look at that." She had spotted a bench made from two tailgates off Chevy pickups. It was a pretty good spot for an aging editor to take a rest. And, I decided, a good excuse to tell you about my talented daughter once again. Just an f.y.i., like most inventive people we feature in FARM SHOW, she's pretty smart. Next year she will graduate with a masters degree in genetic counseling from Stanford University in California.

**"Roller Chain" Rosary**

Robert Rottinghaus just turned 91 years old and he lives in a nursing home in Cedar Falls, Iowa. But that hasn't stopped the veteran FARM SHOW inventor from continuing to innovate. He says his Roller Chain Rosary is a great idea for older farmers.

"It's designed like a regular rosary but uses chain links instead of beads," says Rottinghaus. "I like it because it's heavier and doesn't ball up together like other rosaries do. I got the idea one morning when I was praying. The idea just came to me so I bought enough chain to make two of them."

He used No. 25 stainless steel roller chain. It consists of five 10-link sections of chain held together by aluminum rivets. Rottinghaus and his son used a small punch to disassemble the roller chain into sections, then riveted them back together. A crucifix off another rosary is hooked onto a short length of chain, which is attached to a small rectangular aluminum center piece.

"I like that I can roll it up into a circle that lays flat on the table. Best of all it reminds me of all the farm equipment I worked on over the years," says Rottinghaus, who farmed and ran a manufacturing company called Clever-Tech, Inc.
