Monarchs Are Their Mission

The Monarch butterfly population has declined an alarming 80 percent since the early 1990's, in part because their main food source – the milkweed plant – has become scarce. That fact led to a life mission for Minnesotans Ward and Ann Johnson who have given away thousands of packages of milkweed seed purchased with their own money.

At 73, Johnson admits that he and his wife are passionate about saving monarchs. Many people do not know, he says, that the delicate insects migrate more than 2,000 miles every year from across the United States and Canada down to Mexico. "The fact that monarchs travel so far every year is magic to me," says Johnson.

Monarchs lay eggs on the back side of milkweed leaves. The caterpillars hatch and eat 20 to 25 leaves before they grow big enough to create a cocoon and later emerge as a butterfly.

If you send a self-addressed stamped envelope to the Johnsons, you'll get up to 3 free packages of milkweed seeds you can plant. For a \$25 donation to their "Save Our Monarchs Foundation", you'll receive as many as 100 packages of 30 to 35 seeds. Couples interested in unique guest favors at a wedding can get a bulk discount.

During the first year of operation, the Johnsons and other volunteers distributed more than 500,000 packets of seeds to people in 48 states.

"See-Through" Semi Trucks

Passing big trucks on 2-lane roads may get a lot safer if this idea from Samsung catches on. A camera on front of a truck films the road ahead and feeds the picture to a big screen monitor on the back of the trailer. Cars following behind can check the monitor before venturing out into the passing lane.

Samsung has successfully tested the idea in Argentina - where nearly one person per hour dies in a traffic accident on that country's badly congested roads - and is working with governments around the world to meet road safety rules and regulations with the new system.

Ever Had A \$75 Steak?

Sometimes as publisher of FARM SHOW, I have to make tough executive decisions. Such was the case recently when I read the story in this issue (page 6) about Akaushi beef from Japan. Proponents of the "new" range-fed cattle not only tout the heart-healthy benefits of the meat, they also claim it's the best-tasting beef in the world. I'm not one to let a claim like that go untested so I decided I had to do a taste test.

The problem is these animals are still rare in this country so a single ribeye steak sells for \$50 - plus \$25 overnight shipping from Texas. As I placed the order online, I figured out that maybe what makes this meat good for your heart is the price because my heart was racing. It wasn't easy for this farm boy to pay \$75 for a single steak.

It arrived in Minnesota the next day, packed with ice in a small cooler (see photo). It certainly didn't look like much in the box but that night, after about 10 minutes on a very hot grill, I took my first bite and realized it was really something special. The meat was well-marbled, very tender, and absolutely the best steak I've ever tasted. Melt-in-your-mouth good! I don't know if Akaushi beef is really better for your health than any other beef, but it tastes really, really good. If they can ever get the price down, I hope to have more of it.
