## Best And Worst Buys

forms well in the snow. It gives an added feeling of safety over small cars. However, performance of the 4.3 V-6 engine and 4-speed transmission is marginal."

David Heng, Gilman, Iowa: "My best tractor is a Deutz 140A. Good power, fuel economy and easy to operate. The front wheel assist sure makes a difference on time spent in the field. We had some fuel pump troubles but the dealer took care of them.

"Our worst tractor is a **David Brown** 1410. Vibrates so much you can't keep light bulbs in. The 4-speed range and 3-

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speed transmission make it difficult to get the right speed range on the go.

"We used to have a 704 Uniharvester with a 717 combine which we thought was great until we traded for a New Holland TR 75 combine. It was like going from a Pinto to a Mercury Grand Marquis. We've harvested in less than half the time with few breakdowns. Real easy to operate. It has a Ford diesel engine which is a little under powered under full load and on hills but is good enough for me. Uses 1.25 gal. fuel per acre combining beans."

W.C. Smith, Jesup, Iowa: "When Ford says quality is Job I, they aren't kidding. I'm very satisfied with my 1986 Lincoln Town car."

Dean Koeppe, Veblen, S.Dak.:
"A 4-WD 4-270 White tractor bought new in 1985 is my best buy. I can't really find anything I'd like to change. It's fun to drive and comfortable to ride in. The Caterpillar 6-cyl. engine has good lugging power. I like that it's easy to service and that it doesn't use transfer cases like some other 4-WD's. The power shift didn't shift right at first but the dealer fixed it in just a few days.

"My worst buy was a seed cleaner sold by the JSX Corp., called the Whizzer. It's lucky if it can do 1/4 what they said it could do. I made a down payment of half the selling price and then they decided not to deliver it. After many months, and lots of worrying, I finally got one but I had to drive 350 miles and make a deal with the manufacturing firm. They were also being taken to the cleaners by the same JSX Corp. In the meantime I contacted the Better Business Bureau and the Attorney General. I was impressed with the Minnesota Attorney General's office. I still get letters from them. The last one stated that the owners of the company were all in jail."

Bob Tweedie, Delisle, Sask.: "Despite a cracked weld on the swing arm frame and a small problem with slipping canvasses which the manufacturer corrected, my Willcar Autotran 25-ft. swather with sliding table is a best buy. Simple to maintain, easy to transport and lays a nice single or double swath."

He nominates his 1982 Adja silver dye spray marker as "worst buy". "It's messy to mix dye, marker solution settled overnight and filters plugged. It also didn't leave a mark that I could see well enough when used on a truck-mounted sprayer."

Harold Bratland, Hythe, Alb.: "Versatile tractors are my best buy. I bought a 1968 D-118 and a 1974 800 used. They get good fuel economy, are fairly easy to service and repairs are reasonably priced."

Lawrence Dool, Thorsby, Alb.:
"I bought my 1968 Ford 630 combine in 1980. It'd been parked for about 7 years when I bought it. All it needed was a fuel pump and a battery and it took right off. I've used it for 6 years with no additional repairs. With its 50-in. cylinder and Melroe pick-up, I don't think there's another combine that can compete with it capacitywise."

He nominates his Sears Craftsman electronic 3/8-in. drill as "worst buy". "The automatic chuck doesn't work properly, the switch fell out several times, it powers out and the variable speed goes up and down on it. In other words, it's pure junk. You'd expect better service for a \$139 drill, especially since my \$30 Black & Decker that's 17 yrs. old outperforms it by a long shot."

Gary Struyf, Thedford, Ont.:
"The only enjoyment I got out of my
1978 6-cyl. Jeep J-10 pickup with 3speed stick shift was when I handed the
keys to the dealer for a new Ford. The
Jeep could hardly pull 3 empty wagons
down the road. At 42,000 miles, it had
rust holes in the box as big as eggs and
the rest of the body was rusting badly.
Couldn't keep exhaust systems on it.
And, every time it rained, your feet got
wet. The ride was so rough your head
would hit the cab roof."

He's happier with his Kalo 12-v. hand-held Mighty Mixer for soybeans. "I plant solid seeded soybeans with a Tye drill. The mixer does an excellent job of mixing beans, Anchor seed treatment and peat inoculant. Sure beats using a paddle to stir the beans."

Kevin White, Keeling, Virg.: Kevin nominates his 1982 Massey Ferguson 285 tractor as "best buy". "It has 38-in. rear wheels for adequate ground clearance to cultivate 2-row tobacco. Starts easily in cold weather, has short turning radius, good weight distribution and excellent fuel economy. Also has good drawbar horsepower, roomy cab and good visibility under the tractor."

John Nelson, Brayton, Iowa: "I had 10 Vermeer balers before this one and had minimal problems with them. But my worst buy was a 605J Vermeer baler. The grease seal fell out of the gearbox, and the bottom broke off of the tailgate cylinder. I had problems with the tailgate coming unlocked while baling and problems getting it locked on sidehills. It also had a broken roller. problems with a roller moving on a shaft and rubbing on the baler, broken shaft in a roller, and numerous broken welds, including on the bar that holds the baler together. The twine arm would bend every time a little hay would stop on the pickup. One light on the monitor wouldn't work, the chain oiler used about 2-gal. of oil a day and the chain tightener wouldn't stay on. After many calls and a couple of trips to the factory, they finally agreed to take the baler back for a price.
