We have been sent a photocopy of a story from FARM SHOW dated January, 1979, and entitled, "One Blower Does It All", sub-titled "New Air System Loads, Unloads Silos".

Quoting from paragraph 3 — "Howard Harvestore in England reportedly has purchased about 40 of the revolutionary air systems for loading silage in and out of Harvestores". The air system mentioned is that produced by the

Neuero Corporation, of West Germany.

We would like to clarify this misstatement

Neuero approached us recently with a view to marketing their loading, unloading system in our well-known Harvestore structures. We rejected their proposition as we were not prepared to sacrifice the well-established advantages of the bottom unloading, oxygen limiting, breather bag principle incorporated in the Harvestore system.

We deny categorically that not only have we not bought 40, we have not bought one of these pneumatic unloaders.

The Neuero machine is simply another type of top loader/unloader and, because of this, the in-store and feeding period losses are increased due to the introduction of high volumes of air.

The only situation where this type of mechanism can be considered useful is on farms where lack of tractor power means that precision chopping is not possible. But both in Europe and the U.S.A. the advantages of precision chopping are well documented and, therefore, we recommend precision chopping, wilting, and storing in an oxygen-limiting Harvestore system."

E. J. Yuhaz Jarrettsville, Md. I would like some information on mixing oil with diesel fuel. About 40 years ago, a relative of mine worked at a saw mill. The mill was run by a diesel engine. One day, they ran out of fuel and couldn't get to an area where there was more diesel fuel available. I'm told they mixed 50 gallons of motor oil with 5 gallons of kerosene or gasoline and ran the diesel engine on that. I don't recall for sure if it was gasoline or kerosene that they used. However, I believe it probably was kerosene because gasoline would pre-ignite in a diesel engine.

Could someone tell me if this mixture would burn in a diesel engine, give the same power and not damage the engine? It seems that it should work since they all come out of the same barrel of oil. I have read where farmers used waste crankcase oil in a 1:3 or 2:3 ratio to diesel fuel to stretch the fuel. They had to change the fuel filter more often because of metal debris in the burned oil. I would appreciate hearing from anyone that may have some experience and recommendations to make regarding mixing new or used oil with diesel fuel to help stretch the supply.
