

British Farmer Inventions

We subscribe to hundreds of farm magazines, including many from other countries. One of the best farm publications in the world is Farmer's Weekly from England (www.fwi.co.uk). Their editors run a farm invention contest every year. Here are a few of this year's winners, courtesy of machinery editor Oliver Mark. (Note if you Google the inventor's name along with Farmer's Weekly, you can find the complete original story.)



Bale Retriever - Joe Williams and Tim Ansel wanted a faster and more efficient way to collect big square bales. Front hydraulic arms grab bales and drop them onto a hinged platform on the truck cab's roof. It lifts up at the front, sliding the bales to the back

Air-Cushioned Cab Suspension - To improve the comfort of his 2002 New Holland tractor, Irish farmer Albert O'Neill replaced factory springs with a homemade air shock setup. He got the air shocks off an old truck and machined brackets to hold them in place. The tractor had air brakes so he tapped into that air supply.



Cement Mixer Filler - Arwel Davies wanted a faster way to mix cement without buying a bigger mixer. He made a cylindrical "shoveling tube" that's sized to scoop up enough sand or gravel to make one load (38 shovels full). Mounts on front of his skid steer





Bale Accumulator - Alistair Craig pulls this bale handler behind his big Krone baler. It holds five bales. A hydraulic arm shifts bales back and forth, controlled manually from the cab using a rear-mount camera. Bales move easily on steel rollers.

Giant Weed Wiper - Jordan Sizer built this giant 75-ft. wide weed wiper to kill tall-growing weeds in small grain crops. Glyphosate is carried in two tanks, one for each folding wing. There's a 10-ft. section at the rear of the tractor to avoid driving over treated plants.



Portable Calf Trough - Dan Roberts made a 15-ft. long calffeeding trough by cutting five plastic barrels in half and bolting them to a metal framework mounted on an old trailer axle. Drop legs keep it level while in use. He also made a smaller unit with a single row of half barrels.



Critter-Proof Watering Trough - Marcus Smith designed this water trough so it can't be used by badgers, which were spreading disease to his cattle herd. He couldn't raise it higher because calves had to use it so he added a roller to each side that keeps them from getting a grip. It worked so well he converted his creep feeders, too.



This rebuilt Sinclair gas station is a popular tourist stop on Route 66 near Springfield, Mo. The original burned down in the 1950's.

Authentic Route 66 Gas Station

If you've ever thought about taking a trip down historic Route 66, here's another reason to get that trip on the schedule. There are many unusual sights to see along the road but this Sinclair gas station, owned and operated by George Barnes and his wife Barb Turner-Barnes, is one of the best. Barb's father rebuilt the station on its original lot after it burned down in the 1950's.

"We've kept the station alive as a tribute to my father, who became 'fast friends' with everyone who stopped here, from every state and many foreign countries," Barb says. "The station is like a museum, with vintage signs, cars, trucks and old buildings. People can see Dad's office just as he kept it and stroll through flower gardens on the property. Dad wanted every visitor to sign the guest book, and these days we constantly have folks asking to see books from previous years so they can look up their original signatures.'

The station is a time capsule of history on the original 98-year-old, 2,448-mile highway that ran from Chicago to Santa Ana, Calif. The old two-lane has been rerouted onto newer highways in some areas, but there are still many parts of the road where you can travel back in time.
