This Ironing Board Turns Into A Chair

Finding a spot to store ironing boards is a problem in just about every home. When you're not ironing, ironing boards always seem to be in the way.

A California inventor says he's solved the storage problem by building an ironing board that turns into a chair in its "off hours".

"You can set it in the bedroom, kitchen, den or anywhere else and simply fold it out when you need to iron. It doesn't have to be hauled around when you need it and, when it's not in use, it makes a dandy

chair," says Irv Schwartz, inventormanufacturer.

The foam-padded ironing board measures 43 in. by 13 in. It folds from an ironing board into a comfortable chair in less than 10 sec. It has a washable fabric covering that comes in a variety of colors. The framework is made of white pvc tubing.

The board sells for \$49.95.

ELIMINATES GUESSWORK

New Stirring Spoon Tells The Temperature

Here's a handy new way to tell the temperature of soups, fondues, jams and other foods as you stir them. Called the Thermo Spoon, it's a ladle with a built-in thermometer.

As you stir the food, an easy-toread gauge on the top of the handle tells you how warm the food is. The thermometer has readings from 100 to 450° F.

Manufactured by the Thermometer Corp. of America, the spoons are 12½ in. long and have 3½ in. bowls.

They're dishwater safe and are available to give readings in Fahrenheit or Celsius. Suggested retail is \$16.95 for a solid bowl Thermo Spoon, and \$17.95 for a perforated bowl.

HARD-BOILED AND SEALED SHUT

"New" Egg Lasts Up To 60 Days On Shelf

A Kingsville, Ontario egg producer has found a new way to market his product. Jack Bechard now sells "Eggs T" Go" — hard-boiled and sealed eggs that keep fresh for up to 60 days on the shelf.

The eggs are steam-cooked in a special machine (steam cooking avoids cracking) and then coated with a thin cellulose coating in a special machine. The coating can be naturally colored, or colored like Easter Eggs.

The company packages the eggs in 6-packs and 2-packs and sells them in grocery stores and vending machines. The vending machine versions come with salt and pepper packets so you can season to taste. A

6-pack of Eggs T' Go sells for about \$1.25.

Eggs T' Go are marketed in the U.S. by distributor Frank Olmsted of Olsted & Co., Tucson, Ariz., who brought the idea over from Europe, where long-life hard-boiled eggs have been popular for years. The eggs are available in selected areas of the U.S. and Canada.
